Tips on Protecting Your Home from Wildfire

Protecting your home from wildfires involves proactive measures to reduce potential ignition sources and create defensible spaces. Here are key steps from the National Fire Protection Association homeowners can take:

Create Defensible Space: Maintain a buffer zone around your home by removing dead vegetation, leaves, and other flammable materials. This space helps slow the spread of wildfires and provides a safer area for firefighters to operate.

Use Fire-Resistant Landscaping: Incorporate fire-resistant plants and materials in your landscaping. Keep lawns and native grasses well-watered and mowed to a low height. Create fuel breaks with driveways, walkways, patios, and decks.

Maintain Your Home's Exterior: Regularly clean roofs and gutters to prevent the accumulation of flammable debris. Ensure that vents are properly screened to prevent embers from entering your home.

Store Flammable Items Safely: Keep firewood piles, propane tanks, and other combustible materials at least 30 feet away from your home. This reduces the risk of these items igniting and spreading fire to your residence.

Prepare an Emergency Plan: Develop and practice a wildfire evacuation plan with all household members. Ensure everyone knows the evacuation routes and has access to emergency supplies.



Winter tree and landscape watering

As winter settles over Roxborough, it's essential to remember that our landscapes still require attention. Supplemental watering during the colder months is crucial to maintain the health and longevity of trees and shrubs. These tips will help keep your trees and shrubs in tip top shape during the dry and windy winter.

Monitor Weather Conditions: Water during extended dry periods without snow cover, aiming for one to two times per month.

Choose the Right Time: Water only when air and soil temperatures are above 40°F and ensure there's no snow cover. Apply water at mid-day to allow it to soak in before potential freezing at night.

Watering Wisely: For trees, it's best to let water soak into the soil slowly to a depth of 12 inches. Methods include garden hoses, deep-root forks or needles, soaker hoses, or soft spray wands. Apply water to multiple locations under the dripline and beyond, as roots extend well beyond the tree's canopy.

Deliver Enough Water: As a general rule, apply 10 gallons of water for each diameter inch of the tree. For example, a two-inch diameter tree needs 20 gallons per watering. Use a ruler to measure your tree's diameter at 6 inches above ground level.

Consider Mulching: Applying mulch can help conserve soil moisture and protect roots from temperature extremes.

By watering in the winter, you can help ensure your trees and shrubs are ready to thrive when spring arrives.
